He is the Director of the ARC Centre of Excellence in Cognition and its Disorders. The ARC Centre of Excellence, which is funded for 7 years from 2011, investigates 5 areas of cognition: language, reading, belief formation, memory, and person perception. Professor Crain is the program leader of the language project. The ARC Centre of Excellence is a collaboration between Macquarie University, UWA and UNSW, and includes prominent researchers from 14 international locations.

Crain was awarded an Australian Research Council Federation Fellowship

(2004-2009), and is a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia (2006-current). He is currently the Chair of the National Committee on Mind and Brain (Australian Academy of Science), and is a Presidential Nominee on the MIT Corporation Visiting Committee for the Department of Linguistics and Philosophy. He is a member of the Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) Humanities and Creative ARTS (HCA) Research Evaluation Committee and also a member of the Standing Review Board under the Humanities and Social Sciences Panel of the Research Grants Council (RGC) of Hong Kong, China. Crain is a Visiting Professor at the Beijing Language and Culture University, China, and at the Kanazawa Institute of Technology, Japan. He was appointed Macquarie University Distinguished Professor in 2010. In 2011 Crain was on the Understanding Culture and Communities Expert Working Group, Strategic Roadmap for Australian Research Infrastructure, Department of Innovation, Industry, Science and Research.

His recent grants include an ARC Discovery grant to study the acquisition of logical words in English, Chinese and Japanese, an ARC LIEF grant to build the Southern Hemisphere's first MEG brain imaging laboratory, and an ARC Linkage Industrial Partners grant (with the Kanazawa Institute of Technology and the Yokogawa Electric Corporation) to build the world's first MEG system designed for the study of cognitive processing in children.

For the last decade, Professor Crain's research has focused on children's acquisition of semantic knowledge, in particular young children's knowledge of logical expressions. Much of this has been cross-linguistic research, with a particular focus on Mandarin Chinese.
